COVID-19 Related Death Reported in Kings County

HANFORD, CA – The Kings County Department of Public Health (KCDPH) has received confirmation of the 21st Novel Coronavirus 2019 (COVID-19) associated death in Kings County. The exposure of the patient is still under investigation. This individual was over the age of 65 years old.

“COVID-19 has claimed the life of yet another Kings County resident,” stated Edward Hill, Director of the Kings County Department of Public Health. “We extend our heartfelt condolences to the friends and families of those that have been lost to the disease.”

The KCDPH has also confirmed 50 additional cases of a resident being diagnosed with COVID-19. Of the 50 new cases, two of the cases are associated with the State Operated Correctional Facilities in Kings County. KCDPH has determined that two of the new cases contracted the disease through close contact with a confirmed case. The exposure of the additional 48 remaining new cases is still under investigation. Of the total active cases, there are 33 cases being treated in isolation, and all other cases have been quarantined. KCDPH has also identified 45 previously identified cases that have fully recovered from the disease.

KCDPH is currently conducting communicable disease investigations to identify any persons who may have had close personal contact with these individuals, including any friends, family members, or health care professionals, to assess and monitor them for signs and symptoms of illness. Due to privacy laws, no specific information regarding any of the 2,284 cases can be shared with the public.

Kings County residents are encouraged to continue following the recommendations from the California Department of Public Health, the Centers of Disease Control, and the KCDPH to prevent the spread of COVID-19 in Kings County and protect themselves and others from respiratory illnesses:

- Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth with unclean hands.
- Stay in your home as much as possible.
- Wear a face mask or covering, and practice social distancing of at least six feet if it is necessary to leave your home.
- Limit close contact, like kissing and sharing cups or utensils, with people who are sick.
- Clean and disinfect frequently touched objects and surfaces using a regular household cleaning spray or wipe.
- Cover your cough or sneeze with a tissue, or your elbow.
